IDOLATRY

- 1. Definition: Idolatry is the blind adoration or devotion to something in creation and can include philosophies, religious ideals, religious objects, animals, or any manufactured image.
 - Idolatry results when a person is negative to the existence of God at the point of God-consciousness then substitutes devotion to the creature rather than the Creator.
 - It a love towards something, someone, or total occupation with something other than God. Romans 1:21-24.
 - It is a forbidden love relationship because God has not given you permission to love that false god, false prophet, false religious system, or creature.
 - Love towards God is to be directed to His person, His essence, His Word, His Son, and His divine plan.
- 2. Idolatry is forbidden by God: Exodus 20:3; Deuteronomy 6:14; Exodus 23:24; Deuteronomy 4:28, 5:7, 7:16, 8:19.
- 3. Idolatry is considered spiritual adultery, Jeremiah 3:8-10; Ezekiel 16:22-24; 23:24-30; Revelation 17:1-5.
- 4. Idolatry in the mind precedes the practice of idolatry, Judges 2:10-13; Ezekiel 14:7.
- 5. Idolatry is associated with greed and sexual sins, Ezekiel 22:3-16; Ephesians 5:5; 1 Corinthians 6:9.
- 6. Demons function through idols and the practice of idolatry to seduce their arrogant worshippers, Zechariah 10:2; 1 Corinthians 10:19-20.
- 7. Idolatry can produce psychotic conditions in the soul, Jeremiah 50:38, especially where demon influence is present.
 - A. Idolatry produces weariness, anxieties, confusion, emotional imbalance, lack of reason, fear, neurosis, paranoia, and psychosis.
 - B. Giving God the credit for something He has not done is a result of mental idolatry. Example: "God blessed our church (a Christ denying cult) with new members this year." God will not accept praise for evil activity.

- 8. Under a family curse many of the kings of Judah believed that the idol temples in the land brought "good luck."
 - A. Solomon, Rehoboam and Abijah believed this.
 - B. Abijah's son, Asa, removed idol temples and broke the family curse, 2 Chronicles 15:8.
 - C. No one liked what he did and everyone complained about it, even the priests complained but Asa stuck with his guns for he was occupied with Christ.
- 9. When idol worship controls a nation, men become morally and spiritually weak so women have a greater influence on the government.
 - The government responds to these matriarchs and new laws are made to accommodate them.
 - The weak men go along with them and liberalism takes a giant step towards destroying the Laws of Divine Establishment and the Divine Institutions.
 - For example, the death penalty is removed because it is seen as "cruel and inhuman punishment."
 - Strong law enforcement becomes non-existent and there is coddling of criminals.
 - Victims rights are ignored while the "rights of the criminals" are promoted.
- 10. Idolatry, therefore, causes a nation to be judged through the 5th cycle of discipline. Isaiah 2:8; 18-20; 21:9; 36:18-20; 37:12-19; Jeremiah 2:27-30; 3:6-11; 7:17-20; 17:1-4; Ezekiel 6:4-6.
 - Five cycles of discipline upon a nation are explained in Leviticus 26.
